Mr. Quinn-Hurst seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

2 Approval of April 2022 TTC Meeting Minutes

Mr. Quinn-Hurst made a motion to approve the minutes as presented; Mr. Clark seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

ACTION ITEMS

6 2022-2026 Transportation Improvement Program June Amendment

Ms. Jones described the four projects in the proposed amendment. There were no questions or discussion.

Mr. Jackson made a motion to recommend Board approval of the June amendment. Mr. Quinn-Hurst seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

INFORMATION & DISCUSSION ITEMS

8 Spokane Transit Authority: I-90/Valley High Performance Transit Corridor

STA Senior Transit Planner Hamid Hajjafari shared information about plans to expand commuter options and enhance transit services throughout the corridor to address increasing population growth in the area.

9 2024-2026 TIP Call for Projects Update

Ms. Jones provided background information about the call for projects, the scoring process, and the amount of funding available for this call, and the amounts that were available in the 2018 call. She presented the draft project scoring sheet, and the group was asked to consider the following funding allocation questions:

1. The #1 ranked project has a significant funding request; how should it be handled?
2. In past practice, SRTC focused on geographic distribution with regards to funding. Should that be continued?
3. Past practice ensured that SRTC funded various project phases; should project phases be balanced?
4. How should SRTC handle projects that receive awards from other grant programs? Which funding is the priority?

Members discussed at great length. Comments included:

- Providing information about funding from past calls and by geography would be helpful to set context
- There can be a lot of value to agencies by funding PE phases; helps them to explore additional grant opportunities for future phases
- Request for information about the largest single award in last four years
- There have been past conversations about equality in funding between rural and urban, but not so much between the urban jurisdictions
- Expressed caution about being too restrictive in applying funding by geographic indicator
- Discussion about projects awarded PE funding then having to return funds because additional grants were not awarded. Comments that PE phases typically deliver quickly, which helps meet the federal obligation target
- Possibility of awarding funds in a phased approach over several years for projects with large funding requests
- Discussion about process for a contingency list and the pros and cons of partial vs full funding
- SRTC funding has become a primary source of funding for small towns' projects since the TIB funding is now extremely difficult to obtain
- Many projects on this list have also applied for funding from other programs (WSDOT, NHFP, etc). Suggestion that SRTC contact these funding sources for a status update
- Suggestion that the SRTC funding decisions could be deferred a bit agencies hear about the other funding sources
- Request that staff create several different funding scenarios for the TTC to evaluate
- Expressed support for the rural projects on the list

Chair Note said due the amount of discussion, meeting time is running short; the group may want to consider deferring Agenda Item 7 to the next meeting.

Mr. Picanco made a motion to defer Agenda Item 7 to the June meeting. Ms. Green seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

10 Freight Mobility Strategic Investment Board Priorities

Mr. Fletcher explained that FMSIB is developing a statewide prioritized list of freight investments and part of the process involves obtaining investment/project priorities from MPOs, such as SRTC. He reviewed project eligibility requirements and FMSIB's prioritization criteria. The list is due to FMSIB by 08/15/22.

He shared a draft list of potential projects and stated that next steps include verifying project attributes and readiness with local agencies, bringing the list before the TTC and TAC in June and request for Board action in July.

The group was asked if SRTC should prioritize the project list before submitting and if so, what criteria to use. They were also asked to consider if a working group should be formed to review and analyze projects.

- Could SRTC take the draft list and compare it to the existing regional priority list
- Suggested that staff review the applications from SRTC's call for projects and vet them for the FMSIB list before forming a separate working group to discuss
- Ms. Bollenback said the organization has received feedback that we should involve our advisory committees and Board in more of the agency's planning work. So the agency is providing an opportunity for TTC involvement if members choose to be involved in prioritization development.
- Asked if this process might be an opportunity to explore freight supporting corridors?
- There was consensus from members that most or all of the dialogue and work for development of a prioritized list can be accomplished by staff before formation of a work group. Several members volunteered to be part of a work group if it is needed.

11 Agency Update and Future Information Items

Mr. Stewart said that in the interest of time the two agency update items will be distributed to TTC members via email.

Requested Action:

Recommend the Board approve awards for the 2024-2026 SRTC Call for Projects as represented in either Option 1 or Option 2 as shown in the “Program of Projects” (**Attachments 1 and 2**).

Key Points:

- After receiving guidance from the SRTC Board of Directors and input from the Transportation Technical Committee (TTC), Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC), and Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Working Group, SRTC staff worked with applicants to develop two draft “Program of Projects” for Committee consideration. The guidance and feedback include provide geographic distribution across the region, finish projects that SRTC has previously awarded funding, and provide two funding options.
- Option 1 proposes awarding the number one ranked project as close to \$10M as possible (**see Attachment 1**).
- Option 2 focuses more on regional distribution of federal funds by fully funding two additional projects (**see Attachment 2**).
- A comparison of Option 1 and Option 2 is shown in the table on the next page. The blue cells illustrate funding changes between the two options.
- SRTC must obligate between \$11M and \$12M per year to avoid federal funds being sanctioned.
- Ranked projects were selected for funding for a variety of reasons, including 1) eligibility for certain funding types 2. advance regional equity 3) the project phases matched up with funding available each year 4) overall program balance between advancing projects to the next phase and starting new projects.

Board/Committee Discussions:

- The Board, TTC and TAC discussed and shared input about this topic at meetings in January, April and May.
- In February the Board approved the 2024-2026 Call for Projects Principles of Investment, which included off-the-top awards to SRTC and Spokane Regional Transportation Management Center.

Public Involvement:

All Board and committee meetings are open to the public. Projects receiving funding will eventually be incorporated into the Transportation Improvement Program, which is updated yearly and has a 30-day open public comment period.

Supporting Information**TOPIC: 2024-2026 TIP CALL FOR PROJECTS**

Background:

- **Overview** – The 2024-2026 Call for Projects was issued on 02/11/2022, to identify and prioritize transportation projects eligible for a variety of funding types totaling roughly \$32M. The awards will be for projects and programs to be executed in Federal Fiscal Years 2024-2026.
- **Application Review Process** - Eight Transportation Technical Committee (TTC) members on the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Working Group reviewed & edited the SRTC 2018 Call for Projects Application to update the application. Updates included improved question clarity, minor scoring adjustments, and removed duplicative questions across sections.
- **Applications Received** - SRTC received 51 applications from nine member agencies. Applications include the initiation of new projects as well as advancing existing projects to the next phase or to completion.
- **Eligibility** - SRTC Staff and WSDOT Local Programs worked with member agencies to ensure application completeness, consistency with SRTC policies, and eligibility for various funding programs.
- **Scoring Process** – Three members of the TTC, two members of the Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) and two SRTC Staff reviewed and scored applications. As a result of those efforts, the 2024-2026 SRTC Draft Priority Scoring is attached, **Attachment 1**. Individual scores were entered into a master score sheet to develop an average overall score for each project. The master score sheet can be provided upon request.
- **Funding Allocation Principles** – With input from the committees, the SRTC Board developed Principles of Investment for this Call for Projects to help guide funding decisions. Other important funding considerations include program eligibility and project delivery timelines. SRTC staff will be seeking additional feedback on funding considerations that are related to this Call.

Additional Details:

- On 12/09/2021, the SRTC Board approved the 2022 TIP Guidebook which includes the 2024-2026 Call for Projects schedule and additional guidance on TIP project delivery.
- On 02/10/2022, as part of the 2024-2026 Call for Projects, the SRTC Board approved resolution 22-04 awarding \$2.1M to the Spokane Regional Transportation Management Center (SRTMC) for operations, \$1.5M to SRTC for planning activities, allocation of at least \$1.5M to small towns during this call and held \$9.2M aside for a future preservation call for projects.
- Participating agencies and the public are provided an opportunity to comment on the TIP development through a variety of means. Throughout the year, the public is invited to attend SRTC advisory committee meetings to discuss project selection, TIP amendments, the TIP Guidebook, and the development of the next four-year TIP. Documentation from the meetings is also posted on the SRTC website.

TOPIC: **FREIGHT MOBILITY STRATEGIC INVESTMENT BOARD (FMSIB) PRIORITIES**

Requested Action:

Recommend Board approval of either the Option A or Option B regional priority freight projects list, for submittal to FMSIB, as shown in **Attachment 1**.

Key Points:

- In 2021, the Washington State Legislature directed the state's Freight Mobility Strategic Investment Board (FMSIB) to develop a statewide prioritized list of freight investments.
- FMSIB's process for developing this list is detailed in their [Phase 1 report](#), which was completed last year for the 2022 Legislature. In the report, the FMSIB Board established general investment priorities by defining "Target Areas" and "Desired Freight Outcomes," which include "Relative Investment Amounts" identifying the percentage of overall investment that should be spent towards the various targets and outcomes.
- Phase 2 of this effort will include collecting project and investment priorities from local governments, regional planning organizations, and other statewide associations. To inform this work, FMSIB has requested that the state's MPOs and RTPOs provide a list of their regional freight investment priorities. Eligible investments must be: (1) located on the state's Freight and Goods Transportation System (FGTS) or benefit the FGTS and (2) under construction within six years.
- In accordance with TTC feedback in May, SRTC has coordinated with member agency staff to identify potential projects and prioritization criteria. The resulting prioritized project lists, along with details on their prioritization criteria, is provided in **Attachment 1**.
- SRTC must provide FMSIB with its list of regional freight investment priorities by 08/15/2022. FMSIB's final report is due to the Legislature on 12/01/2022.

- FMSIB Investment Priorities were discussed by the TTC in May.
- The SRTC Board discussed this item at their 06/09/22 meeting and the TAC will receive an update on 06/22/22.

STA, in conjunction with the City of Spokane and Spokane County applied for a Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Transit Oriented Development (TOD) grant to build on the collaborative work started with the DivisionConnects project, which provided the basis for the Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA) for the BRT alignment, as well as began initial land use analysis.

Expected Outcomes/Products

Spokane County and the City of Spokane propose to jointly develop a Division Street BRT Transit-oriented Development (TOD) Corridor Land Use and Infrastructure Plan. As jurisdictions responsible for land use planning and regulation, the City and the County are positioning the Division Street Corridor for greater inclusion, housing and transportation equity, and improved economic vitality. The plan will help the County and City successfully meet the needs of each station and maintain continuity of the Division Street corridor, while celebrating the unique character of each neighborhood. Effectively, the resulting plan will be a sub-area plan to the City's comprehensive plan, with an emphasis on how fixed guideway transit, including Business Access and Transit (BAT) lanes, can improve the community. The plan will include corridor development policies and station development plans for the full corridor and will include both a proposed timeline and recommended financing strategies and will set the stage for revised TOD-focused zoning codes and resolutions.

Human services transportation planning is also a required component of FTA's Section 5310 grant program – Enhanced Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities.
- The planning process has focused on public outreach over the last few months, with all interested parties and target groups encouraged to take the survey. With the survey closing at the end of June, staff will review public feedback and draft the plan update in July/August. A first draft of the CPT-HSTP document will be complete by 9/1/22.

- During the first half of 2022, staff will conduct a series of discussions with the SRTC Board and Committees to develop a deeper understanding of transportation topics, seek input and direction from members on key issues, and revisit screening criteria to develop a more data driven evaluation strategy for transportation project prioritization.
