



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
SRTC Metropolitan Planning Area (Spokane County)



Measure #4: Serious Injury Rate per 100 million VMT




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

Commute Trip Reduction: Background

• CTR is a statewide planning effort to reduce the amount of drive alone trips on our roadways.

• Key goals:

Reduce congestion

Reduce emissions

 Promote alternative commute/work methods such as transit and teleworking

Commute Trip Reduction: Background cont.

• Transportation Demand Management (TDM) study

- Significant air pollution
- Increased automotive traffic
- Increased reliance on imported petroleum
- CTR program established
 - Washington State Clean Air Act of 1991
 - WSDOT TDM team and CTR Board created

• Transportation Demand Management (TDM) study


- Significant air pollution
