Council Member Higgins made a motion to approve the excused absences from the meeting. Ms. Meyer seconded the motion. The motion was passed unanimously.

2 Public Comments

Mr. Lowe, resident of Spokane Valley provided public <u>comments</u> regarding safety concerns associated with the Barker Road Corridor expansion project included on the SRTC Unified List.

ACTION ITEMS

#3 Consent Agenda

- a) Minutes of the October 2024 Board of Directors Meeting
- b) Vouchers for October 2024

Ms. Meyer made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda. Council Member Higgins seconded the motion. The motion was passed unanimously.

4 CY 2024 Budget Amendment #2 – IT Vendor Project

Mr. Griffin proposed an amendment to the CY 2024 budget. This amendment reallocates \$23,000 from contingency funds to improve IT services and enhance the security and functionality of SRTC's cloud system.

Mayor Freeman motioned to approve the CY 2024 Budget Amendment #2 – IT Vendor Project as presented. Council Member Higgins seconded the motion. The motion was passed unanimously.

5 Executive Session

SRTC Board Chair Al French called for an Executive Session in accordance with RCW 42.30.110(1)(g) for the purpose of discussing the performance of a public employee. Once the meeting resumed, Ms. Meyer stated the recommendation of the Committee of 3% increase for the cost of living and 4% increase for merit was reviewed and agreed upon by the Board members during their breakout session. (R-24-25)

Mayor Haley motioned to approve the salary increase for SRTC Executive Director. Council Member Higgins seconded the motion. The motion was passed unanimously.

INFORMATION & DISCUSSION ITEMS

#6 SRTC Guiding Principles

Mr. Lien discussed the proposed revisions to the guiding principles, highlighting the existing language and explaining the changes made to clarify and better align them with the policies and plans of SRTC. He noted that these principles will inform project evaluations for the Unified List and Call for Projects, the upcoming needs assessment for the MTP, and all future planning efforts at SRTC. The final adoption of these updated principles will be part of the Horizon 2050 plan, which will come before the Board for approval in late 2025.

Comments included positive feedback from Council Member Klitzke, who stated the revisions are moving in the right direction. Council Member Klitzke acknowledged email comments were provided from City of Spokane staff regarding the Equity Guiding Principle.

#7 Smart Mobility Plan - Draft Report

Mr. Lien introduced Sean Messner, CivTech, who is part of the consultant team working on both the Resiliency Plan and the Smart Mobility Plan. He highlighted the need to integrate technology into the multimodal transportation network, with goals such as advancing regional performance objectives, supporting mobility as a service, using data to guide driver and planning decisions, reducing system vulnerabilities, educating stakeholders, and addressing other priorities.

Mr. Messner reviewed the assessment of current transportation technology, provided several recommendations from the Plan, and outlined a timeline for completion. He shared strategies for implementing these recommendations and discussed policies related to asset management, transportation demand management, and decision-making processes. The Smart Mobility Plan will be presented for Board approval at the December meeting.

#8 Resiliency Plan- Draft Report

Mr. Lien re-introduced Mr. Messner who presented on resiliency planning and recovery strategies after disruptions to the transportation system. Mr. Messner explained the focus on both man-made and natural hazards in the area, using a three-step methodology. He shared data inputs that consider hospitals, military resources, bridges, and road resiliency, highlighting a sample disruption scenario. He emphasized how disadvantaged communities face greater challenges in returning to normal after events and showcased critical Spokane County roadways at risk.

Mr. Messner also proposed project and policy solutions, including networking with nearby regions to stay updated on high-risk areas.

The discussion among Board members highlighted lessons from the Cheney wildfires, emphasizing operational challenges and overlapping projects, including a WSDOT project on the Unified List. Suggestions were made to narrow the focus to key areas for greater impact, particularly on preservation efforts. Questions were raised about risks to the US-2 corridor near Fairchild Air Force Base (FAFB), with updates provided on efforts to facilitate access through a new gate at Craig and Thorpe Road. Appreciation was expressed for including Highway 27 on the list of critical roadways, and the critical connection to FAFB was noted as a priority.

9 Federal Unified List - Draft Policy Statements & Project Adjustments

Ms. McMenamy explained that the Unified List serves as a key communication tool and focused on federal policy statements, emphasizing the importance of reauthorizing the federal transportation bill. She reviewed legislative priorities, including a focus on safety, addressing a \$1 trillion backlog in maintenance and preservation, and updating the federal funding formula to reflect current needs. She presented draft ideas, such as expanding direct recipient status for local agencies and shifting from discretionary to formula-based funding for better local control.

During the discussion, it was asked if WSDOT supports the direct funding approach. Mr. Larson responded that while he couldn't speak for WSDOT, the approach works well and suggested exploring the process. Ms. Bollenback added that this approach doesn't take funding from WSDOT but requires more local oversight, ensuring control stays with local entities. Chair French mentioned that previous grant metrics, like cost-per-job created, might reappear with new administration priorities.

Ms. McMenamy also highlighted additional policy statements and their potential local impacts. Mr. Fletcher clarified that there were no new projects are included in the federal version of the Unified List, though amounts have been adjusted for federal review. He outlined next steps, including a follow-up with the Board in December.

10 WA. State Dept of Transportation (WSDOT) Consolidated Grant Ranking

Mr. Redlinger, Planner, informed the board that the Consolidated Grant Program supports Human Services and Public Transportation, funding both capital and operating costs through a unified application process that combines state and federal resources. For the current cycle, only two projects were submitted from the region, both sponsored by Special Mobility Services. SRTC staff coordinated with WSDOT to manage submissions and enlisted volunteers from the committees to score the projects. While SRTC staff facilitated the process, they did not participate in scoring.

Spokane Travel Training received an A grade, and Spokane Mobility Management received a B grade. These rankings will return to the Board in December, with final submission to WSDOT in January.

11 CY 2025 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Guidebook - Draft

Mr. Stewart explained the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Guidebook has been updated for 2025, offering policies, procedures, and critical timelines for developing the TIP, which includes the recently approved 2025-2028 TIP. Updates to the guidebook feature information on the Call for Projects for funding years 2027-2029, a revised schedule for these calls, and clarification of administrative modifications. Approximately \$36 million will be available in the upcoming funding cycle, with discussions beginning at next month's meeting on funding allocations, such as preservation, small-town projects, and regional transportation planning activities. Key decisions are anticipated by February 2025, with project applications due in April and final board approval of funded and contingency project lists scheduled for July.

Notable changes include consolidating the preservation and general calls for projects into a single cycle every three years, streamlining the process to maximize efficiency. Administrative modifications now include changes to project budgets of less than or equal to 30% rather than just under 30%. The updated schedule also addresses board and committee meeting timelines to prevent delays in accessing funding. The TIP guidebook will be presented to committees for recommendations next week, with final approval expected at the December board meeting.

12 Executive Director's Report

Ms. Bollenback stated SRTC applied for and received the SS4A grant of \$485,000. These funds would be used to address the many crashes and poor decisions of the drivers. The program would start in July 2025. She thanked Mr. Ulrich, Principle Planner, and staff for getting this submitted and approved.

13 Transportation Technical Committee & Transportation Advisory Committee Meeting Summaries No questions or comments.

14 Board Member Comments

Board members highlighted events in their perspective areas.

15 Chair Comments

Chair French highlighted the SRTC Board terms for Major Employer and Freight Representative are expiring at the end of this year. The Administration Committee has recommended that Mr. Yost and Mr. Ewers be reappointed for threeyear terms, with the final approval to be brought before the Board in December as part of the consent agenda.

Additionally, there are two vacant seats on the SRTC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC). Chair French noted that last year's recruitment efforts resulted in a contingency list of applicants who could potentially fill these positions. d utilizing the

TOPIC: SMART MOBILITY PLAN – FINAL REPORT

Requested Action:

Approval of Resolution R-24-26 adopting the Smart Mobility Plan.

Key Points:

- For the past several months, SRTC, with consultant assistance, has been assessing the state of our transportation system and analyzing potential technological solutions to improve its efficiency and safety. The project is complete as documented in the final Smart Mobility Plan, which is available here for review.
- Smart mobility refers to the use of technology and data to improve the efficiency, safety, accessibility, and sustainability of the transportation system. The report uses a set of criteria to screen various technology applications and includes recommended strategies and actions to advance regional transportation goals (see recommendations in Table 3 in the plan document linked above). Appendix D in the Plan details electric vehicle charging needs, policy, and guidance.
- The Plan's recommended actions will be considered in an assessment of overall regional transportation needs, which will inform the Metropolitan Transportation Plan update.

Board/Committee Discussions:

Staff presented an initial discussion on this work program at the December Committee meetings and at the January 2024 Board meeting. It was again presented to the respective committees and Board in May, June, July, August, and September 2024. A review of the Draft Plan was provided to the committees on 10/23/24 and to the Board on 11/14/24. Both the TTC and TAC recommended Board approval of the Plan at their 11/20/24 meetings.

Key Points:

- Project work for the Resiliency Assessment is complete with release of the final Resiliency Plan, <u>available</u>
 <u>here for review</u>. The Plan identifies vulnerabilities and recommended actions to improve transportation
 system resiliency (Strategies and Actions begin on page 35 in the linked plan document). The work was
 conducted with consultant assistance.
- Resiliency is defined as the ability of the transportation system to anticipate, prepare for, and adapt to changing conditions and recover and regain functionality after a major disruption or disaster. The project builds on information in the Spokane County Hazard Mitigation Plan to assess the risk of potential hazard scenarios and the impact on the transportation system. The technical assessment utilized the Resiliency and Disaster Recovery Tool (RDR), a GIS-based tool developed by the USDOT Volpe Center.
- The Plan's recommended strategies and actions will be considered in an assessment of overall regional transportation needs, which will inform the Metropolitan Transportation Plan update.

It was again presented to the respective committees and Board in May, June, July, August, and September 2024. WHEREAS, the Resiliency Assessment resulted in completion of a Resiliency Plan that details planning steps, strategies, and actions to improve system resiliency and strengthen key transportation facilities, and the Plan will be used to advance future projects, programs, and plans at SRTC and its member agencies; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that SRTC Board adopts the Resiliency Plan as linked in the Board memo for Agenda Item 5.

TOPIC: CY 2025 UNIFIED LIST (FEDERAL VERSION) - APPROVAL

Requested Action:

Approval of Resolution R-24-28, adopting the 2025 United List (Federal Version).

Key Points:

- The Unified List of Regional Transportation Priorities (Unified List) is a strategic tool used to communicate current regional transportation priorities to state legislators and Congressional representatives for potential funding opportunities. SRTC annually updates the Unified List.
- The SRTC Board of Directors approved Resolution R-24-08, establishing the 2025 Unified List development process and project evaluation criteria (4/11/24). This was followed by a project submittal period from 4/22/24 through 5/17/24. Projects were required to be on an agency's current legislative agenda and consistent with the region's metropolitan transportation plan, Horizon 2045.
- The 2025 Unified List (Federal Version), provided as an **Attachment**, includes legislative statements and project funding requests that are intended for a federal audience.
- During the December Board meeting, staff will review the policy statements and project federal funding requests of the 2025 United List (Federal Version).

Board/Committee Discussions:

The SRTC Board reviewed the Draft 2025 Unified List (Federal Version) at their 11/14/24 meeting. The TAC and TTC recommended its approval at their 10/23/24 meetings. The SRTC Board approved Resolution R-24-19, adopting the 2025 Unified List (State Version) at their 9/12/24 meeting. The TAC and TTC recommended its approval at their 8/28/24 meetings. Project evaluation criteria scores, along with potential options for the 2025 Unified List, were presented to TTC and TAC at their 6/26/24 meetings. These items were also presented to the SRTC Board at their 7/11/24 meeting. The Unified List development process and project evaluation criteria were presented to the TTC and TAC at their 2/28/24 and 3/27/2024 meetings. The SRTC Board approved Resolution R-24-08, establishing the 2025 Unified List process and project evaluation criteria, at their 4/11/24 meeting.



About SRTC

Spokane Regional Transportation Council (SRTC) is both the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) for Spokane County. SRTC provides regional transportation leadership and coordination by conducting comprehensive, cooperative, and continuing transportation planning with representatives from local jurisdictions, tribes, transportation providers and local stakeholders.  - → Contribute towards building a resilient transportation system to mitigate the impacts of climate change.




LEGISLATIVE PRIORITY STATEMENTS

PREPARING FOR TRANSPORTATION BILL REAUTHORIZATION

Continue funding critical programs that provide needed resources to improve transportation <u>safety</u>

Nearly 95 percent of people who die using our Nation's transportation networks are killed on our streets, roads, and highways. Roadway fatalities and the fatality rate declined consistently for 30 years, but progress has stalled over the past decade and went in the wrong direction in 2020 and 2021. There were 40,990 lives lost on U.S. roads in 2023—down slightly from 42,939 in 2021 which was the largest number of fatalities since 2005 (Source: USDOT). The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) bolstered the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) with an infusion of additional funds and created a new grant program, Safe Streets for All (SS4A). These programs are critical in supporting a reduction in fatalities and serious injuries.

SRTC encourages our federal partners to continue funding these programs into the next transportation authorization. Some local agencies are just getting underway with developing SS4A planning "action" grants and will need time to plan and prepare implementation grants to fully release the benefit of the program.



Continue funding transportation system <u>maintenance and</u> preservation

Every day people, communities, and businesses throughout our Nation rely on the existing network of highways, roads and bridges. Our transportation system gets goods to market, people to work, students to school, and so much more. Recently FHWA estimated a \$1 trillion backlog in repairs and maintenance needed to improve the condition of more than 619,000 bridges and 4 million miles of public roads. SRTC is appreciative of the BIL in providing a level of funding that addresses the need to repair and replace aging infrastructure. However, there will continue to be a need for investment in maintenance and preservation beyond the life of the current BIL.

SRTC supports a long-term balanced approach to funding will allow states and local agencies to plan and program needed system preservation and maintain appropriate workforce levels to properly address and deliver roadway maintenance and preservation projects.



Modernize the <u>federal funding formula</u> to ensure funding equitably supports population centers

The BIL provided \$303.5 billion in contract authority from the Highway Trust Fund. Of this amount, 90 percent was apportioned to the states by formula. Another \$47.3 billion in funding from the General Fund was provided for the Highway Infrastructure Program. Roughly 72 percent of that was distributed to the states by formula. Unfortunately, the formula used to allocate highway funding relies on 2000 census data. Utilizing outdated data in any calculation undermines the program it's intended to serve. Furthermore, higher growth states, like Washington, are not receiving the share of funding needed to address the mobility demands of a growing population. Since 2000, the population in Washington increased just over 30 percent (from 5,910,912 in 2000 to 7,724,031 in 2020) while the US overall grew by just under 19 percent.

Expand Direct Recipient Status for Certain Federal Funding Programs

Currently MPOs rely on pass-through funding from state DOTs, which can lead to delays and reduce the flexibility needed to meet local transportation needs. Granting MPOs direct recipient status for specific federal funds would streamline the funding process, allowing for quicker and more efficient implementation of projects that directly benefit communities. This change would reduce administrative delays, enabling MPOs to align more closely with local needs and priorities while expediting project delivery.

SRTC supports direct recipient status for MPOs which would promote greater accountability and empower MPOs to have a more active role in shaping transportation investments that impact their regions.

Shift from Discretionary to Formula-based Funding for Certain Programs

Discretionary grants, while beneficial, can lead to unpredictable funding allocations that make long-term planning challenging for MPOs and other local agencies. Discretionary grant programs circumvent the local collaborative planning process and shift the decision-making to federal agencies. A shift toward formula-based funding for certain federal programs would allow for a more predictable and equitable distribution of resources.

SRTC supports a shift to formula-based funding to ensure a consistent and transparent mechanism, enabling regions to make informed infrastructure decisions and meet both immediate and future needs with greater confidence.

Ensure access to transportation in support of <u>affordable housing</u> <u>strategies</u>

- Ensure access to affordable, reliable, and equitable transportation options which are an integral component of affordable housing strategies.
- Provide additional resources to local jurisdictions to plan for and accommodate affordable housing.

Fund regionally critical projects on the SRTC Unified List

 Invest in projects collaboratively identified by the SRTC Board of Directors in the Unified List.

Encourage diversity in the development of <u>clean fuel</u> technologies

- Assess the need for and continue to develop electric charging infrastructure capacity.
- Support the emergence of alternative fuels in support of low or no emission transportation across the spectrum of vehicle types through pilot projects or other means.

Address funding gaps that are anticipated due to the loss of gas tax revenue

- Create a strategy to address the loss of gas tax revenue that includes increasing the public's awareness and understating of the issue.
- Support pilot projects that will assist in identifying transportation revenue strategies.





TOPIC: TITLE VI PLAN & AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) UPDATES - APPROVAL

Requested Action:

Approval of Resolution R-24-29, adopting SRTC's updated draft Title VI Plan and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) complaint materials.

Key Points:

- SRTC's current Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) was scoped to include a Title VI Plan update. At SRTC's TMA Certification Review, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) provided SRTC with a set of recommendations that help inform the update process.
- SRTC addressed state and federal recommendations, including clarifying language regarding written translation and oral interpretation, additional TTY information, provision of translated vital documents, and adding an environmental justice section to the plan document.
- SRTC provided clarification regarding which protected classes are Title VI protected classes and which
 classes are more appropriate to include under a broader statement of nondiscrimination. In alignment
 with SRTC's TMA Certification Review recommendations and based on the advice of our legal council,
 the new Title VI Policy clarifies which classes are protected under Title VI. A separate nondiscrimination
 statement will be included on the website and on other planning documents.
- As part of this clarification process, SRTC also developed separate ADA Complaint Procedures and ADA
 Complaint Forms, including translated versions. The full draft Title VI Plan may be viewed here. ADA
 Complaint materials are linked <a href=here.

WHEREAS, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin in programs and activities receiving federal financial assistance; and

WHEREAS, SRTC commits to assure that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, as provided by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, be excluded from participation in, denied benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any SRTC program or activity regardless of funding source; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), SRTC commits to assure that all its programs and activities are accessible to people with disabilities and to provide people with disabilities an equal opportunity to benefit from its programs, services, and activities; and

WHEREAS, SRTC intends to avoid, minimize, or mitigate disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects, including social and economic effects, on minority populations and low income populations;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of the Spokane Regional Transportation Council approves the updated ADA Complaint materials and Title VI Plan document, which includes the Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan.

TOPIC: WASHINGTON STATE DEPT OF TRANSPORTATION (WSDOT) CONSOLIDATED GRANT RANKING -

APPROVAL

Requested Action:

Approval of Resolution R-24-30, adopting SRTC's final project rankings for the 2025-2027 WSDOT Consolidated Grant Program.

Key Points:

- The WSDOT Consolidated Grant Program released its application for the 2025-2027 biennium in June 2024. For the 2025-2027 cycle, WSDOT will award consolidated funding from six state and federal sources. Project guidance is from our local Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan.
- The state's application review process requires RTPOs to submit regional rankings for projects submitted to the Consolidated Grant Program. As the RTPO for Spokane County, SRTC facilitates the project ranking process. Rankings are based on A-B-C allocations from the state.
- At the September TAC and TTC meetings, SRTC staff recruited volunteers to review project applications
 using a set of scoring criteria. Volunteers submitted their scores, which were averaged and used to
 determine letter grades. The full project applications may be viewed here.
- The final scores are included as **Attachment**.
- The Board will take action on the final project rankings at their December meeting.

Board/Committee Discussions:

The Board discussed this item in November. The TAC and TTC were first presented this item in September and unanimously recommended Board approval at their November meetings.

Public Involvement:

All SRTC Board and Committee meetings are open to the public.

The consent agenda containing October TAC meeting minutes was approved unanimously.

Title VI Plan & ADA Updates

Mr. Redlinger provided an overview of updates to SRTC's Title VI Plan and ADA materials, requesting a committee recommendation for Board approval in December prior to state review.

Mr. Sahlberg made a motion to approve the Title VI Plan & ADA Update as presented. Ms. Callery seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

WSDOT Consolidated Grant Ranking

Mr. Redlinger reviewed the grant process, project rankings, and scoring, requesting recommendations for Board approval in December. Following approval, the submission to WSDOT is planned for January 2025.

Ms. Zentz made a motion to approve the WSDOT Consolidated Grant Ranking as presented. Mr. Henson seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Smart Mobility Plan - Final Report

Mr. Lien is seeking a recommendation for Board approval. He presented the final plans that include short- and long-term strategies and ongoing efforts. TAC members expressed public concern about the negative consequences of micromobility, such as e-scooters and e-bikes, that impact users of the region's sidewalks and pedestrian infrastructure. Specifically, micromobility devices often present an ADA barrier when improperly parked on sidewalks, creating obstacles that are difficult, if not impossible, to pass for someone that is vision-impaired or in a wheelchair. Second, safety conflicts occur with fast-moving e-scooters and e-bikes traveling directly next to pedestrians, typically on the sidewalk space. The TAC urges that any implementation of micromobility strategies be contingent on greater assurances of sidewalk compliance/enforcement, proper parking of devices, and education to mitigate risk and avoid user conflicts.

Mr. Sahlberg made an amended motion to approve the Smart Mobility Plan – Final Report excluding the micromobility language. Ms. Callery seconded the motion. The motion unanimously.

Resiliency Plan – Final Report

Mr. Lien presented the Resiliency Plan, detailing strategies to enhance the transportation network's resilience to hazards and integrate resiliency into future planning and policies.

Ms. Zentz made a motion to approve the Resiliency Plan – Final Report as presented. Mr. Eash seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

CY 2025 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Guidebook – Recommendation
