#4 Chair Report on SRTC Board of Directors Meeting

Chair Trautman shared highlights of the January SRTC Board meeting.

ACTION ITEMS

#5 Consent Agenda

Mr. Clark moved to approve the December TTC meeting minutes. Mr. Weathers seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

#6 Transportation Performance Management: PM1 Safety

Mr. Ulrich is seeking a recommendation to the SRTC Board to agree to plan and program projects that contribute to the accomplishment of WSDOT HSIP (Highway Safety Improvement Program) targets. He provided a recap of HSIP, emphasizing both funding and the statewide program allotment. Mr. Ulrich reviewed the selection process for awarded projects and discussed the five measures used to assess safety performance, detailing the statewide data calculation methods. Despite a slight improvement from the previous year, all performance categories were observed to be trending unfavorably. He also highlighted the Washington State Department of Transportation's (WSDOT) Target Zero policy, which aims for zero fatalities and serious injuries statewide, and explained the calculation of targets based on trend lines. The deadline for the SRTC Board to adopt a target is 02/28/2024.

There were a few comments and questions:

- Measure 5 of the Safety Performance includes only pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Vulnerable Road User was also defined

A motion to approve the Transportation Performance Management:PM1 Safety was made by Mr. Greene. Mr. Weathers seconded the motion. This was passed unanimously.

INFORMATION & DISCUSSION ITEMS

#7 WA State County Road Administration Board (CRAB) Presentation

Ms. Wall provided a comprehensive overview of the agency, focusing on various aspects of county road management and funding programs. She highlighted the extensive county road network, totaling 78,000 lane miles, and emphasized the creation of CRAB to oversee all 39 road agencies. She explained the fuel tax allocation and county oversight. She discussed the agency's support services to the community by highlighting the four funding programs were outlined: Rural Arterial Program (RAP), Emergency Loan Program (ELP), County Arterial Preservation Program (CAPP), and County Ferry Capital Improvement Program (CFCIP). Each of the programs were explained with specific allocations and purposes. She detailed ELP's role in disaster relief, addressing challenges such as disproportionate distribution of funds and insufficient allocations for rural arterial programs. Opportunities for improvement included investing in road preservation and maintenance, exploring new funding avenues, and addressing gaps in the county transportation system. She stressed ongoing efforts to conduct studies and audits to better serve rural communities, offering training and collaboration opportunities.

There were a few comments and questions:

• At the legislative level the secretary of state just verified several of the former budgeted items.

#8 Regional Safety Action Plan – Update

Mr. Ulrich conducted a review of the grant program called Safe Streets and Roads for All . In FY22 the program allocated \$813 million to 385 grants nationwide. The majority of funds are designated for developing action plans. To be eligible for funding to build projects an agency must have a qualifying action plan. Ms. Wilber, from Kittelson and Associates, explained how the focus of the actionable safety plan is on addressing fatal and serious injuries through a safe system approach involving various policies and strategies. The schedule is aggressive, encompassing data analysis and community engagement to amplify the voices of those affected by fatal and serious crashes.

Ms. Dean presented data on fatal and serious injury crashes from 2018 to 2022, indicating an increase in 2023 compared to 2022. Key statistics include the prevalence of younger individuals in bike crashes and a majority of pedestrian crashes occurring in dark areas. Mr. Ulrich emphasized the importance of setting targets, with a commitment to target zero fatalities and serious injuries. Three strategies were highlighted to achieve these targets, with a focus on eliminating fatal and serious injury crashes by 2042. The target would be evaluated every 4-5 years with periodic reassessments for continual improvement.

There were a few comments and questions:

- The rationale for the aggressive schedule was explained.
- Some of the community engagement planning includes the opportunity to interview transit users at the plaza and other public venues to allow those that may not attend the open house to have a voice.
- An update on the data release timeline was highlighted and the 107-page memo can be provided.
- Consideration of not just current but future safety issues based on population growth was highlighted.
- There was a request for photos or narratives depicting crashes.

#9 Agency Update and Future Information Items

- Committee members are encouraged to contribute to discussions on topics of interest. Please contact Mr. Ulrich and Chair Trautman for information.
- TIB confirmed the Complete Streets total award amount will be closer \$50 million versus the \$35M reported last month.
- SRTC successfully conducted its first Equity Working Group session.
- Asset management funds totaling \$15.6 million were awarded to six projects (15% statewide allocation).
- GSI meeting was held in Olympia with Mr. Bollenback in attendance. The Climate Commitment Act was highlighted at that meeting.

#10 Adjournment

There being no further business, Chair Trautman moved to adjourn at 2:25pm. Mr. Jackson motioned. Mr. Picanco seconded.

TOPIC: 2024-2027 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) MARCH AMENDMENT

- The TIP is a programming document that identifies specific projects and programs to be implemented during the upcoming four years. Any project with federal funds from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) or Federal Transit Administration (FTA), as well as any regionally significant projects, must be included in the TIP.
- After a TIP has been incorporated into the Washington State TIP (STIP), project changes can be requested by local agencies. Minor changes can be made administratively by SRTC staff. Significant changes must be made through the amendment process, which requires a 10-day public comment period and action by the SRTC Board of Directors.
- The TIP serves as an important tool in implementing the goals, policies, and strategies identified in Horizon 2045, SRTC's long-range plan. As such, any projects included in the TIP, including projects added through monthly amendments, must be consistent with Horizon 2045.
- Consistency with Horizon 2045 includes a demonstration of financial constraint and conformity with regional air quality plans. The proposed January amendment has been reviewed by SRTC staff for compliance with federal and state requirements and consistency with Horizon 2045.
- TIP amendments must be approved by the SRTC Board to be incorporated into the Washington State TIP (STIP). Projects receiving federal funds must be in both the TIP and the STIP to access those funds.
- Pending approval by the SRTC Board, the March amendment will be incorporated into the STIP on or around 04/19/2024.

Key Points:

- The Unified List of Regional Transportation Priorities is a strategic tool used to communicate current regional transportation priorities to state legislators and Congressional representatives for potential funding opportunities. SRTC is committed to annually updating the Unified List.
- Since 2023 SRTC has developed two versions of the list, one for state legislative use and one for federal use.
- The SRTC Board of Directors approved the 2024 Unified List at their 09/14/2023 (state version) and 11/09/2023 (federal version) meetings.
- SRTC staff is proposing changes to the safety and equity project selection criteria, based on recent work efforts relating to the Regional Safety Action Plan and Equity Working Group. These changes are detailed in the 2025 project selection criteria document, included as an **Attachment**.
- SRTC staff is also proposing that needs identified in the Regional Safety Action Plan be incorporated into the 2025 Unified List document.

Project Evaluation Criteria

The SRTC Unified List of Regional Transportation Priorities outlines critical investments to improve the performance of the regional transportation system. The Unified List includes a variety of project types supported collectively by members of SRTC with consideration for equity, economic vitality, and safety among other screening criteria that indicate beneficial outcomes to both the state and the region.

ECONOMIC VITALITY

Targets transportation investments aimed at the development of a multi-modal system that enhances accessibility and connections among regional activity centers.

Question 1A (5 points)

▷ Does the project provide access within or between two or more regional/local activity centers?

TOPIC: TRANSPORTATION PERFORMANCE MANAGEMENT: NEW GREENHOUSE GAS RULE AND TARGETS

Requested Action:

None. For information and discussion.

Key Points:

- In December 2023, the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 23 Part 490 was amended to include an additional Transportation Performance Management (TPM) reporting requirement for states.
- The new greenhouse gas (GHG) rule requires states to report the percent change in total tailpipe CO2 emissions on the NHS as compared to the reference year (calendar year 2022).
- Federal regulations also require MPOs to set targets for their respective planning areas.
- At the February meeting, staff will present background information and target setting options.
- MPOs have until July 30 to either commit to support WSDOT targets or establish their own declining 4year target for the MPA.
- The TTC will be asked to take action related to target-setting for the new GHG rule on 03/27/2024.

Board/Committee Discussions:

The new performance measure is being implemented off-cycle, and this is SRTC staff's first discussion with the TTC on this topic. Targets in the other two PM 3 performance categories are set on four-year cycles. Targets for PM2 – Infrastructure and PM3 – System Performance were most recently adopted in Spring 2023.
